As your Chapter Representative to the ASA, I attended the Council of Chapters meetings at the JSM in San Francisco, August 1-6, 2003. This year's emphasis was on hosting a Career Day, and there is funding available for chapters who are hosting for the first or second time. There were several presentations from small chapters on their first career day. The most impressive of these was from the Hawaii chapter, which is spread across the Hawaiian Islands; they hosted their first career day this past year. The Year In Review

The Connecticut Chapter held two first time events this past year. In May the First Annual Connecticut ASA Statistics Mini-Conference was held at the UConn EdgeLab in Stamford. The theme was, "What's New / What's Next? 21st Century Statistics." The keynote address was given by Dr. David Salzburg, who gave his insights on the theme and also discussed ways in which we can keep abreast of developments in the industry. Ten additional presenters gave talks on a variety of topics. Thirty-one people attended. Special thanks go to Tim Keyes, who did the lion's share of organization and worked hard to make this first conference a great success.

The other first time event in the chapter was the Honor a Statistician award, given to a statistician who has made significant contributions to statistics and its applications and has been involved in chapter activities. The first ever recipient of the award was Naitee Ting. Naitee has been active in the chapter as an officer and has authored numerous journal articles and made other contributions to the profession while working as a Biostatistician at Pfizer in Groton. Naitee received the award at banquet held in his honor in July. Prior to the banquet, he presented a talk called, "Design of Dose Response Clinical Trials." The Honor a Statistician award was the brainchild of Fred Djang, who served with Tim Keyes and Sterling Hardy on the selection committee.

The chapter co-sponsored four talks in the last year. In November, Nell Sedransk presented "In the Intersection of Metrology and Statistics" at UConn. Also in November, Robb Muirhead and Eve Pickering presented "Applications of Multivariate Reference Regions to Clinical Laboratory Data" at Pfizer. In January, Heping Zhang of Yale gave a talk called, "Trees and Forests: Methods and Applications." In March Uwe Koehn gave a talk at the Hartford ASQ meeting called, "Reliability Analysis, Weibull vs. LogNormal By the Pictures."

For the second year in a row a Colloquium for AP Statistics Teachers was co-sponsored by the Chapter and by Bristol-Myers Squibb. The

colloquium was organized by Fred Djang. In addition to being an active member of the chapter, Fred has been working on furthering the development and teaching of AP Statistics on the state and national level. Presenters at last year's colloquium were Seth Thompson, Anne Cross, Uwe Koehn, Marianne Messina, Neal Thomas, Tai-Tsang Chen, Mike Brown, Dave Stock, Michelle Capozzoli, Debjit Biswas, Aparna Anderson, and Peggy Weaver, who is an AP statistics teacher at Norwich Free Academy.

For the seventh year in a row the Chapter has sponsored the Connecticut Statistical Poster Competition, which is discussed in an accompanying article.

The past year was a great success for the chapter thanks to the work of many volunteers. I'd like to thank our President (now Past President), Bill Pan, for his constant encouragement and involvement in the activities and Tim Keyes, who, as Vice President, led the organizing committee. I'd also like to thank Marianne Messina, our former Past President, who has given many years of service to the chapter and spearheaded many fine activities.

An election for new chapter officers was held in June with the following results: Tim Keyes was elected President, Sterling Hardy was elected Vice President, Marilyn Lender was elected Secretary, and Mingxiu Hu was re-elected Treasurer. Patricia English assumed the position of Chapter Representative from Fred Djang at the start of 2003. Alexia Iasonos has agreed to serve as Chair of the Education Committee. Sonali Das continues to be the Webmaster.

We look forward to an exciting year ahead, including a 2nd annual mini-conference and a second Honor a Statistician award winner. We have already had a presentation by George Tiao called, "The SAR Procedure: A Diagnostic Analysis of Heterogeneous Data" and a Short Course on Reliability by Bill Meeker, both of which took place in September. In addition, the third Colloquium for AP Statistics Teachers was held in October.
